Description:

Professor John Gabriel Byrne, see Fig.1, was the founding professor and long-time head of the University's Department of Computer Science [1], a Senior Fellow, dedicated public servant, and notably self-effacing and kindly gentleman, who is acknowledged by many as the "Father of Computing in Ireland". This book [2] draws on an appeal for the memories of those who knew Prof.Byrne well, see Fig.2.

In the view of many, Professor John Byrne was an extraordinary asset for Ireland. He was at the forefront of computing in the country, and of educating generations of university students on the engineering and application of computers.

Prof Byrne however had many other interests and influences beyond computing. He was a student of the classics, as well as an engineer. He was a strong supporter of feminism in the male oriented professions. He was keenly interested in politics, an enthusiastic follower of rugby, and always thoroughly enjoyed horse racing.

He was a quiet influencer, and often achieved results despite inertia and resistance in the system. He was a strong but gentle inspiration for so many people, and yet never sought public recognition.

In recognition of his life, a team of his colleagues and friends have taken the initiative to form a collection of memories and of influences of John. The intent is to publish these, in due course, in both a physical and e-book.




Figure 3: Professor John Byrne: Reminiscences: Father of Computing in Ireland, front cover
