Paul, that map is what I went from for the Ludgate/Willis farm
but the locals say that land/farm has been in another family
for hundreds of years, so there are two possibilities:
(1) the Ludgate/Willis farm is not at that site.
(2) the very republican locals are denying any CoI ownership.

See the mail I sent 20 min ago re transfer of ownership.

Go to the Griffiths Site <http://www.askaboutireland.ie/griffith-valuation/> Search for
Ludgate/ County Cork/ Parrish Kilshannig. Select Robert Ludgate and view the original
page.. You will find him listed as an occupier and an intermediate lessor. From the
first column note the number and letter. Go back to the results page and select the
map. Find the number/letter on the map. That is the farm. John Ludgate also has
property in Skarragh and other townlands. Note Adam Newman owned 3000 acres in Co Cork
in 1875 but lived in Monkstown. Local folklore only goes back to 1923.

From Griffiths you can see that there were very few land owners , mostly CoI, and the
land was let to tenant farmers who provide cottages to the workers. Land managed by
RCs was mostly poor quality. If you can find the Ordnance Survey Memoirs (reprints by
QUB) or Griffiths Notes you will get a complete picture.

Davis Ludgate: multiple locals mentioned him as Davis, so it
must be his actual name was John Davis, not John David, and
that he was known as Davis (presumably to disambiguate from
the multiple John Ludgates).

Middle names seem to come and go amongst the Ludgates . He is registered as John only.

Thomas Edward Ludgate: there was actually a Thomas Ludgate who
died in Cork c.1946, so we can't be sure, but the Buckleys
may tell for certain (also when/where Bedelia lived & died),

I think we have been through this. The Thomas Edward who died 1945 in Lombardstown was
a farmer. In 1911 "our" T.E. was a Land Agent's Cashier (Accountant). The only Bridget
Ludgate we found died in Sussex.
