

15. If any case of infectious disease should occur in the house where a Copyist is living, he must immediately report the fact to the Officer under whom he is employed, and must, if required, at once discontinue his attendance. In cases of such enforced absence from his employment, it is in the discretion of the Head of the Department in which he has been serving to allow the Copyist full pay at the usual rate for the period for which it is medically certified that his attendance at the office would be likely to be dangerous to his colleagues.

16. In any year in which an open Competition for Clerkships of the Second Division is held, a Boy Copyist (New Class) who obtains from the Head of the Department in which he is serving leave of absence to attend such examination may also, at the discretion of the Head of the Department, be allowed pay, at the usual rate, for the days during which he is attending the Examination.

No. 253.—CHANNEL ISLANDS.

Guernsey—Whistle Buoy North-north-west of Lihou Island.

INFORMATION has been received from the Harbour Master, Guernsey, dated 7th May, 1896, that a whistle buoy has been moored in a depth of about 15 fathoms at low water, in a position with Grande Etacré Rock bearing S. by E. $\frac{1}{4}$ E., distant $2\frac{1}{2}$ cables; and Flabet Rock East.

Approximate position, lat. $49^{\circ} 28' 0''$ N., long. $2^{\circ} 41' 15''$ W.

No. 254.—BALTIC—THE BELTS.

Intended Light Beacon near Extremity of Stælland Reef.

THE Danish Government has given notice that, during the summer of 1896, a beacon will be erected in a depth of 2 fathoms, in a position bearing N. by W. (N. 11° W.), distant 8 cables, from Ronnen Refuge Beacon, Sicælland Reef:—

The new beacon will exhibit, at an elevation of 44 feet above the sea, a flashing white light every fifteen seconds, thus:—flash, five seconds; eclipse, ten seconds.

Approximate position, lat. $56^{\circ} 5' 0''$ N., long. $11^{\circ} 13' 45''$ E.

The erection of the beacon is to be commenced in the present month, and during the progress of the work the site will be marked by two nun buoys and four mooring buoys.

Further notice will be given when the light is exhibited.
